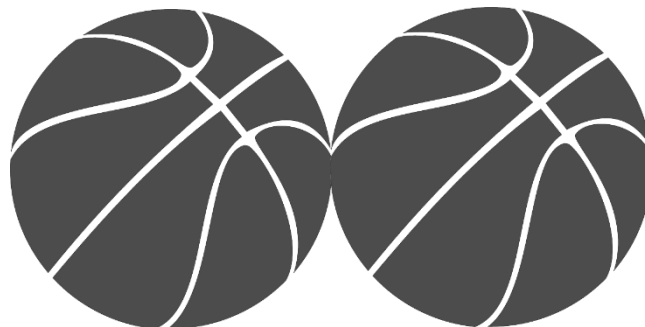

INTRODUCTION, SUMMARY & ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The multiple-crown Calypso Monarch and Road March King of Dominica, Norman “De Ency” Cyrille, in 1988 produced one of his signature calypsos, “Reunion ‘88”, with lyrics such as “Come Leh We Celebrate, Reunion ‘88”... 🎵

During Dominica’s 10th Anniversary of Independence, dubbed ‘Reunion ‘88’, some of the players in Dominica’s basketball arena had very good reason to celebrate. For starters, a senior division (Division I) team captured two of the three major championships of the Dominica Amateur Basketball Association (DABA); then, for the first time ever, a team from outside of the capital – more specifically Grand Bay – captured both league and knockout championships in their division in the same season; and, a 16 & Under Division was included on the roster of the Basketball Association for the first time.

Further, *Dominica’s National Team* moved up several notches in OECS Basketball to place 2nd from the seven participating teams in the 5th OECS

Basketball Tournament; and Dominica’s representative basketball team in the revived Windward Islands Inter-Schools Sports Meet won the basketball segment of the Games. These, and more, transpired in the sport of basketball on the local scene during 1988.

Dominica’s Basketball In 1988 (DBB-1988) is a compilation of newspaper items that were published locally regarding the sport of basketball in 1988. The compilation is meant to serve as a supplement to a document that was produced in January 1989 and captioned, “*Dominica Amateur Basketball Association – Statistics of the 1988 Basketball Season*”; this was produced by the undersigned while serving on the Executive of the DABA at the time.

DBB-1988 comprises 43 newspaper items: 42 articles of varying lengths and one basketball advertisement. These items were all sourced from the weekly THE NEW CHRONICLE newspaper.

DBB-1988 is also one of several compilations of press articles on basketball that have been produced by the undersigned. Some of the editions date back to the early 1980s, but the most recent are for some years in the 2010s.

This compilation is formatted similar to what obtained with previous editions, with articles laid out in two columns, and illustrated mainly with illustrations copied from Google Images Clipart. Three of the illustrations used in the compilation are photographs of



the original photos used in the newspaper in 1988.

In addition to the reproduced items, DBB-1988 also includes compiled lists of teams that competed in DABA's four divisions, as well as other Extras.

The following are summaries of the main contents of the compilation.

DABA ELECTS NEW EXECUTIVE: Although not covered in the 1988 press *per se*, the Dominica Amateur Basketball Association elected a new executive to govern its affairs for the two-year cycle, 1988-1990. The Association's new President was Val Cuffy who had previously played in the DABA League with *Northern Pacers* of Goodwill.

DABA COMPETITIONS & WINNERS:- Apart from two opening ball-o-ramas, the DABA successfully staged nine (9) other basketball competitions among the four divisions in 1988, with two 'double-champions' emerging.

****Division I:** In the Association's senior division, *DCP Cardinals* continued to rule as they captured two of the three major championships at stake. They emerged League and Play-Off Champions, while *John Keller Killer Bees* captured the Knockout Championship. Nine teams competed in Division I in 1988.

****Division II:** *Sixty-Sixers (66'ers)* of Grand Bay also made it a double during Reunion Year 1988, capturing both League and Knockout championships which were at stake. The 15 teams in

Division II were divided into two Zones; the majority of the 'Intermediate' teams were from 'out of town'.

****Division III:** *Moreau's Hoyas* from Pottersville and *Sports & Wear Reefs* of Central Roseau captured the League and Knockout championships respectively. In the League competition, both these teams had ended with 6 wins and 1 loss, but by virtue of the fact that *Hoyas* had defeated *Reefs*, then *Hoyas* were declared champions according to the Rules. Eight (8) teams competed in the round-robin league.



****16 & Under Division:** For the first time ever, the DABA staged a basketball programme, with ball-o-rama, league and knockout competitions, among younger players aged 16 years and younger; this was open to schools as well as non-school players. Only four teams participated, comprising two from secondary schools, one from a rural primary school and the fourth from a sub-urban community.

St. Mary's Academy captured the League Championship, while *Hoyas* from Pottersville took home the Knock-out Championship trophy.

THOSE RUNNER-UP 'WINNERS':

Teams or individuals who place in runner-up positions in competitions are rarely acknowledged or in the lime-light. But on account of 1988 being a year of celebration, then we bring the teams in DABA's three main divisions that emerged runners-up in the various championships in 1988 to the fore.

****Division I League:** *Milo Running Rebels*

****Division I Play-Off:** *Dutch Lady Clouds*

****Division I Knock-out:** *DCP Cardinals*

****Division II League:** *Life of Barbados Dominica Community High School*

****Division II Knockout:** *Design Studio Prowlers*

****Division III League:** *Sports & Wear Reefs*

****Division III Knockout:** *Moreau's Hoyas*

SCHOOLS BASKETBALL: The 2nd edition of the Secondary Schools Basketball League tipped off early in the year. The same five teams which participated in the league's inaugural edition in 1987 were down to vie for championship honours in 1988. These are: *Clifton Dupigny Community College*, *Dominica Community High School*, *Dominica Grammar School*, *St. Joseph Secondary School* and *St. Mary's Academy*. Unfortunately, the newspaper did not carry any story on the outcome of that League; *SMA* may have won.

DOMINICA IN OECS BASKETBALL: *Dominica's National Basketball Team*, under a new coaching and management staff, participated in the 5th OECS Basketball Tournament which was staged in St. Lucia. *Dominica* emerged 2nd among the seven participating teams and showed a significant improvement in team placings over the two previous years' outings.

Although *Dominica* was represented in the 2nd OECS Champion-of-Champions Basketball Tournament, this was not reported in the local press.



However, *Cardinals* placed 4th (from 7 teams) in the Tournament.

DOMINICA IN INTER-SCHOOLS BASKETBALL: *Dominica* emerged champions in the basketball segment of the 2nd Revived Windward Islands Inter-Schools Sports Meet which was hosted by *Dominica*. That win also helped the Nature Island squad secure the overall championship for the Meet.

Dominica played undefeated in their three matches, blowing out all before them. They beat *St. Lucia* 79-53, *St. Vincent* 100-27 and *Grenada* 72-51. They amassed a total of 252 points while conceding 131, for a Goal Average of 1.916 (Pts scored/Pts conceded).

BASKETBALL HALL OF FAMERS: *Dominica* instituted a Sports Hall of Fame as part of Reunion '88 activities, and the only basketballers inducted into that prestigious institution were Wilmoth 'Plastic' LeBlanc and Bernard 'Kiwi' Thomas. A total of 98 sports persons were inducted into the Hall of Fame.



DABA PLAYERS OF THE GAME / MONTH: For the 1988 basketball season, the DABA introduced incentives for players who had excelled in the Association's top division. The first recipient of the Player of the Month award was Lambert Henderson (now deceased) of *Heineken Pros* for the month of May. The second recipient – for the month of June - was Albert Bannis of *Dutch Lady Clouds*. Bannis and Jeffrey Joseph of *By-Trinee Flames* received Man of the Match awards.

There may have been other Man of the Match and Player of the Month awards.

PRIVATE SECTOR SUPPORT: During the 1988 basketball season, the private sector provided some timely and much-appreciated support to the DABA for the national league. Firstly, Harris Paints (Dominica) Ltd. provided the championship trophies for the Divisions I, II and III Leagues, as well as for the Division I Play-Off and Knock-out competitions.

Secondly, Walton Insurance donated the trophies for the Divisions II and III Knockout competitions.

Thirdly, Freedom In Democracy sponsored a *Team Leadership Workshop* which was organized by the DABA for affiliated local teams.

For the Player of the Month awards, *Dominica*' Prime Minister contributed EC \$100 to the Education Trust Fund in the name of the particular players. It should be noted that for 1988, 23 of the 32 teams (71.875% of total) that competed in DABA's three main divisions were sponsored by the private

sector (all 9 in Division I, 10 of 15 in Division II and 5 of eight in Division III).

DISCIPLINARY ACTION TAKEN AGAINST PLAYERS & OFFICIALS:

The DABA imposed disciplinary action against two players, and two officials from one of DABA's senior teams. In the case of the players, one was dropped from the training squad to select the national team; he was also given a 2-game suspension. A junior team player was suspended from participating in the remainder of the 1988 season, as well as for the entire 1989 season.

The two team officials, who came from the same team, and who were both serving suspensions as players from 1987, were slapped with 5-year suspensions for acts of ill-discipline.

FIELDING MULTIPLE TEAMS: For the 1988 basketball season several communities away from Central Roseau fielded teams in the national team, including six that fielded two or more teams in the four divisions. These were: Bath Estate 2 (II, III); Goodwill 3 (I, II, III), **Grand Bay 5 (I, 2xII, III, U-16)**; Pottersville 3 (II, III, U-16); Soufriere 2 (II, III); and Trafalgar 2 (II, III).

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Firstly, I wish to give Thanks & Praises to the Almighty for providing me with the wherewithal to produce yet another compilation of media articles on the

sport of basketball as published in the local press.

I wish to thank Mrs. Lucy Jones at *The Chronicle* office for her invaluable contribution towards the production of this compilation, viz. facilitating the undersigned to have access to their archived, bound editions of *The New Chronicle* newspaper of 1988.



I must also acknowledge national awardee Morris Cyrille – *The New Chronicle's* Sports Reporter during Reunion Year 1988, who sometimes provided some very exciting accounts of the matches. Sports Columnist Reinald St. Havis Shillingford must also be acknowledged for his Sports Commentaries.

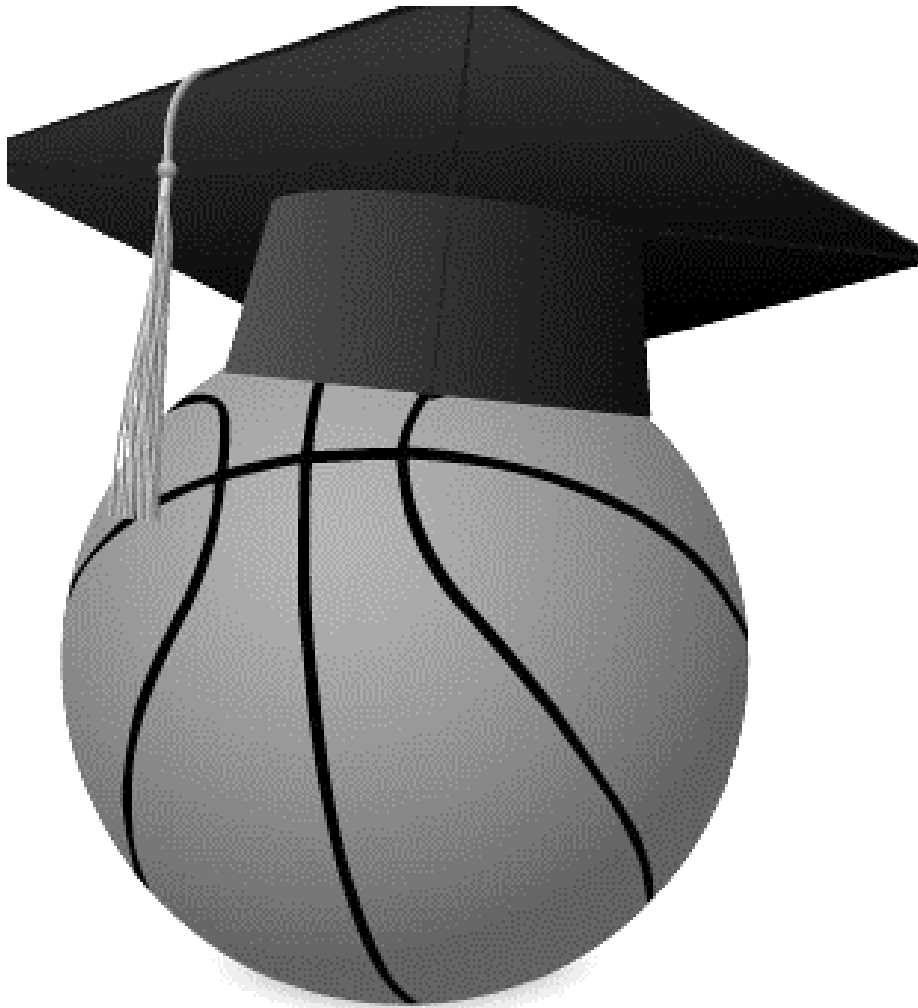

Weekend action in the new basketball season of the Dominica Amateur Basketball Association will see *Lions* against *DCP Cardinals* tonight and tomorrow Saturday, *Flames* and *JK Killer Bees* will contest.

The league was officially opened last Saturday night by Sports Minister Henry George.

Stealing the spotlight in the opening were two 16-year-olds who won the free-throwing and slam dunk competitions.

Ronald [Donald] Zamore of *JK Sharpers* in the Division II League won the free-throwing competition while Donnie Robinson of the *Dominica Grammar School* in the Intermediate Division, won the slam dunk competition.

Zamore started with scoring his preliminary first three-throws to go into the second round which was made by another six from the 15 who had begun.

Dexter Francis of *DCP Cardinals* scored all five of his free throws in the second round to get into the finals, while Zamore netted four. Wilmoth LeBlanc also netted four to be the third qualifier.

Young Zamore got into his own and netted eight out of his ten throws, Francis got in seven while LeBlanc, a veteran of more than 20 years, threw in the



towel after he had missed three of his first six shots.

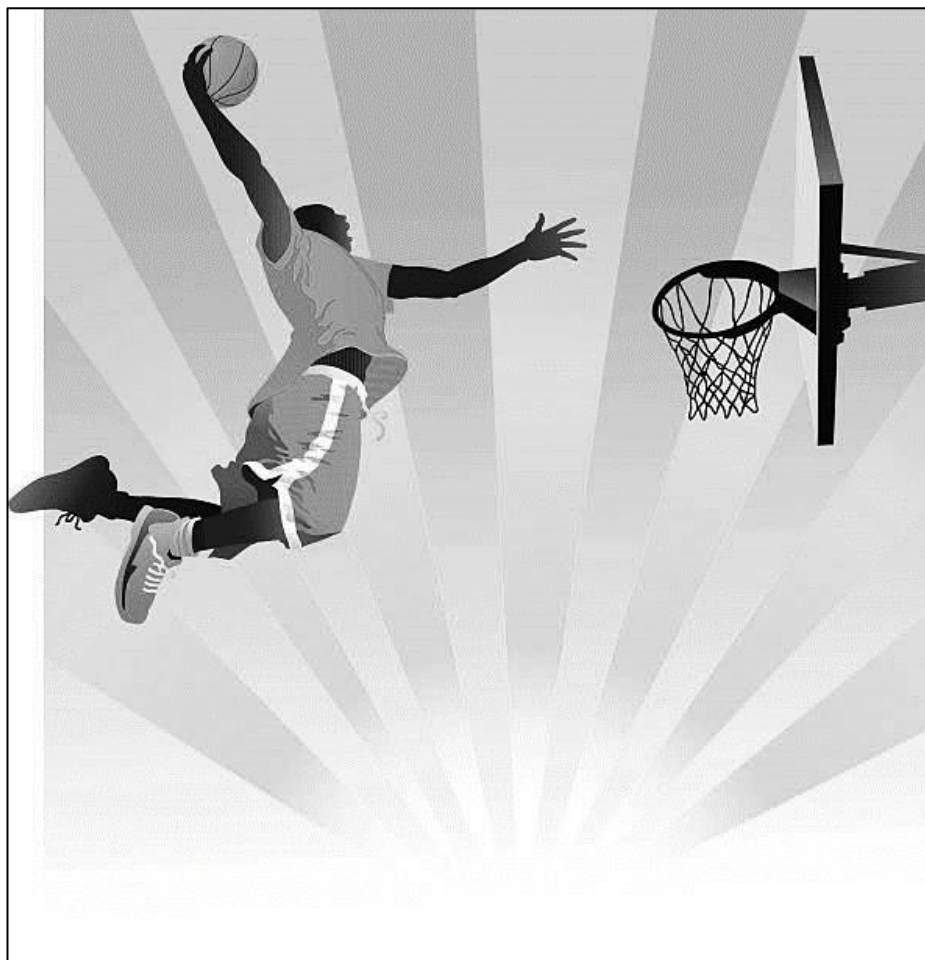
Robinson performed steadily in the first two rounds of the slam dunk competition which began with 13 contenders. From third place at the end of the first round, he moved into second place behind Irving Magloire of *Cardinals*, who had led both times.

Robinson and Magloire were the two finalists after [the] second round of five competitors. Robinson without too much flare sank in his first shot. Magloire followed up with something straight from the NBA, but the ball hit

the back of ~~ream~~ [rim] and bounced back out. Since he scored no points, Robinson only had to net his second shot and win, and that he did while Magloire with something even more extravagant failed to score again.

The match between the *Rural* and *Urban* teams went to the *Rurals* who won 78-73. For *Rurals*, Gary Moore 20 Points, Anicette Moore 16 and Bernard Thomas 12. For *Urban* or city players, Fletcher LeBlanc was flying with 30 and Irving Williams 11.

31 teams are registered for this 1988 basketball season in three divisions.

Dutch Lady Clouds playing for the first time in the Division I League of the Dominica Amateur Basketball Association, registered the highest match points by the end of the first week of league matches.

Clouds held down and created a minor upset by beating the experienced *Heiniken Pros* 84-72 in a match they led all the way.

For *Clouds*, William Graham got 26 points and Albert Bannis 18, while for *Pros*, Gary Moore hit 29.

More Division I victories went to *Milo Running Rebels* 66-55 versus *Owls*; *DCP Cardinals* 79-69 versus *Gordon's Gin Lions*; and *J.K. Killer Bees* 78-68 versus *By-Trinee Flames*.

Killer Bees actually trailed *Flames* at the interval 27-31, but Anthony Emanuel 22 and Curtis John 14 led a spirited fight-back. For *Flames*, D. Thomas 18 and Moses Lewis 14.

A. [Andrew] Magloire scored 24 points and W. LeBlanc 17 for *Owls* in their

losing match with *Rebels* whose top-scorer was Carlton Bernard 14. For *Cardinals* I. Williams 16, F. LeBlanc 16, L. Magloire and E. Francis 14 each. For *Lions*, Augustus Williams 15, C. Williams 14 and R. Jean-Jacques 13.

DIVISION II

In Group 'A' of the Division II competition, *PDC Sharks* trounced *Pros II* 80-55. David Joseph got 20 for *Sharks* and Joseph Titre 16 for *Pros*. In a schools' clash, *Life of Barbados Community High School* trailing 16-25 at the halftime came back to win 44-42 against the *Clifton Dupigny Community College*. J. Joseph got 24 for *DCHS* and Peterson Jno. Phillip 16 for *CDCC*.

[In] Group 'A', *Sixty-Sixers* beat *Dominica Grammar School* 80-61

and *Design Studio Prowlers* beat *New India Bullets* 82-49. Herminus Reid got 22 points for *DGS*; Peter Maxim 22, James Toussaint 19 and Raphael Carbon 14 for *66'ers*; for *Prowlers*, Allan Toussaint and Ross Johnson 15 points each and for *Bullets*, Colin Lestrade 16 and Ricky Allan 14.

Dutch Lady Clouds once again stole the spotlight, when in their second match in the Division I League of the Dominica Amateur Basketball Association came back from 14 points down in the last quarter of their match with the experienced *By-Trinee Flames* to win 92-78.

Flames at the end of the first half held a four-point lead which they easily managed to extend on resumption in the second period. At that point, *Clouds* appeared really rattled, unable

to get their play together as *Flames* went on to lead 66-52.

About this time, Irving Magloire who had gotten only four points in the first half got back into the game, and with some sure-handed dribbling and some good field shooting with able support from his teammates, *Clouds* stormed back to take the lead at 74-73 with less than three minutes to go. *Flames* at this point displayed a certain lack of experience and with Magloire scoring everything, that match had irrevocably swung.

Magloire finished with 21 points, Albert Bannis 22, William Graham 19 and Clyde Pascal 12 while for *Flames*, Moses Lewis 17, Oliver Burton 14, D. Thomas and G. Elie 12 each.

DCP Cardinals remained the other unbeaten team in Division I by holding *Sag [SAG] Motors Hawks [Harks]* 60-44. For *Cardinals*, Fletcher LeBlanc 20 and Jason Richards 19. For *Harks*, L. Jervier 12, A. Harris 10 and M. Casimir 10.

The surprise result of the week was *Gordon's Gin Lions* 79-72 points victory over *Milo Running Rebels*.

Lions led 33-30 at the interval and with some good all-round shooting *Rebels* got to within one point at 51-



50, but that was it for them as *Lions* went on to win 79-72. For *Lions*, Essau Christian scored 31, Augustus Williams 12 and Vivian Lugay 14 and for *Rebels*, Derek Alexander got 22.

The most contentions match and most competitive was the one between *J.K. Killer Bees* and *Heineken Pros* which *Pros* took by one point. The match at the halfway stage was even at 43. *Killer Bees* then made the early running in the second half, [and] at one stage looked [like] they could win it. But in the last four minutes, their rhythm deserted them, aided by a couple disputed calls against them and *Pros* with seconds on the clock got the basket which gave them the match 70-69. Curtis John got 16 points for *Rebels*.

DIVISION II

Dominica Grammar School had a measure of revenge against [defending] Division II knockout champions *Windward Islands [Aloes] Clippers* whom they beat 75-74 in a keen affair.

DGS had enjoyed a 38-25 points lead at the interval, but *Clippers* put on a display to show what stuff champions are made of to get within one point by the final whistle.

For *DGS*, Herminus Reid 23, Brian Hamilton 20 and K. Austrie 10. For *Clippers*, Angus Tavernier 23, Jerome Lewis 27 and Mayers Norris 14.

In other matches, *Hillsborough Special Oilers Wolverines* beat *Castle Bruce Oilers* 69-43; and *Antilles Clouds II* beat *St. Joseph* 60-43.

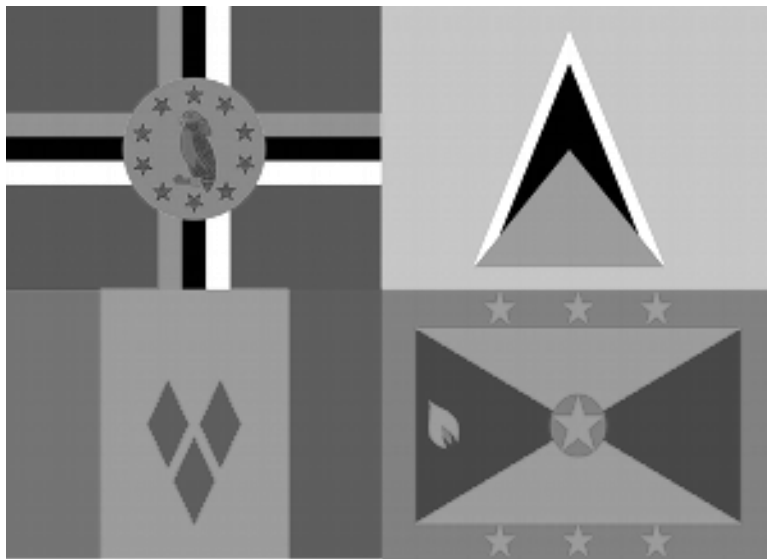

SPORTS COMMENTARY

Dominica is soon to host the Windward Islands Secondary Schools Tournament. To be precise, the exercise will commence on July 23, with a total of about 200 students expected to participate in the five sports disciplines of cricket, **football**, athletics, netball, basketball and now table tennis which is being added this year.

The tournament will in effect be the longest sports event to be held here if one assesses it from the point of view of the number of people to be engaged in the competitions.



Actually, the Caribbean Netball Championships staged at Windsor Park in 1984 was a bigger affair on the scale of

a [the] number countries participating. However, both the number of sports disciplines and the roll call of contestants of the Windwards Secondary Schools extravaganza make it a more sizeable venture.

Accommodation there will be a solid factor and so also providing of food for the participants from Grenada, St. Vincent, St. Lucia and the home territory Dominica.

Looking at these two elements, it is possible to say that the facilities provided by the Dominica Grammar School buildings will indeed prove adequate for the requirements for the occasion. Also, this institution is ideally situated next door to the sporting venues of the Botanic Gardens and Windsor Park where it is proposed to hold the major events of cricket, **football**, netball, basketball and athletics.

If accommodation is solved by such an arrangement, the question of food for 200 people over a 12-day period is not likely to go away so easily. The provisional estimate for food has been penciled in as

\$30,000 and that is through using conservationism as a friendly ally.

There would still be a host of other monetary considerations to be sorted out even before the first ball is bowled or kicked or the very starting gun produces its sharp report. Anyway, as they say with the Olympic Games, the games must go on, and so they will!

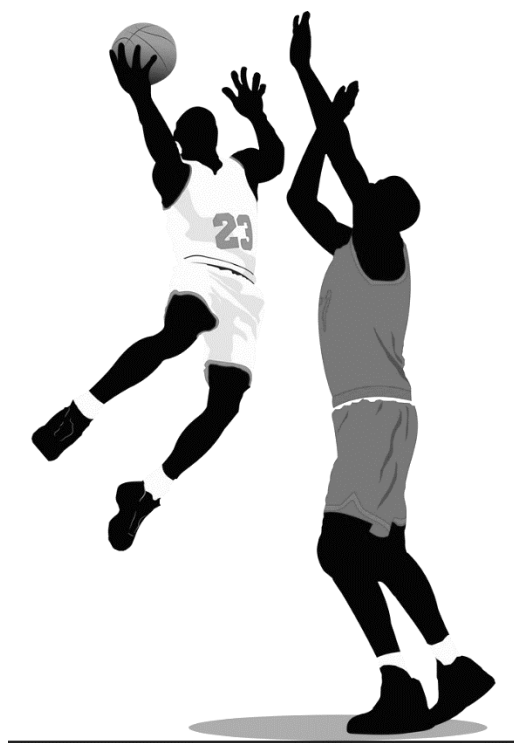
What then does one fancy will whet the appetite of the Dominican public during this competition involving the cream of its youth – boys and girls?

Last year the Grenadians in the first of the modern series of Inter-schools tournaments took the lion's share of the events by winning the cricket, netball and football while Dominica took the basketball and St. Vincent the athletics.

This year, playing at home it is somewhat predictable that Dominica will be in a position to make a much better effort in cricket and certainly in football. Similarly, netball is likely to provide our girls with an opportunity to make up strongly for last year's placing of third.

One consideration each territory will contend with is the matter of school examinations – the age-old extra hurdle for all aspiring student sportsmen and sportswomen. To what extent any of

the territories will give extreme priority to the tournament over and above the academic commitment is left to be seen. Don't dismiss this as unthinkable! The instance of students spending most of the school day preparing for the big tournament is not extremely unknown or even alien for that matter. Some Dominican students moved in that direction in the '50s and '60s!



Very shortly, the Dominica squads for the various disciplines will be nominated to prepare for possible selection to what inevitably is a fairly restricted final selection which can only be arrived at after fairly rigorous training. Even the potential entrants for Table Tennis will need to achieve considerable fitness over and beyond generally estimated match capacities.

In this sport Dominica expects to do reasonably well, in fact extremely well. Next year volleyball and cycling will be new additions to the list of disciplines; and the time to begin preparing for this is right now. The organizing committee has very much on its hands but envisages a successful tournament come late July, counting as it happily can upon the unwavering assistance of local sporting bodies. Similarly, much is being hoped for from all our local institutions to grant the all-important element of financial support so needed to oil the tournament machinery.

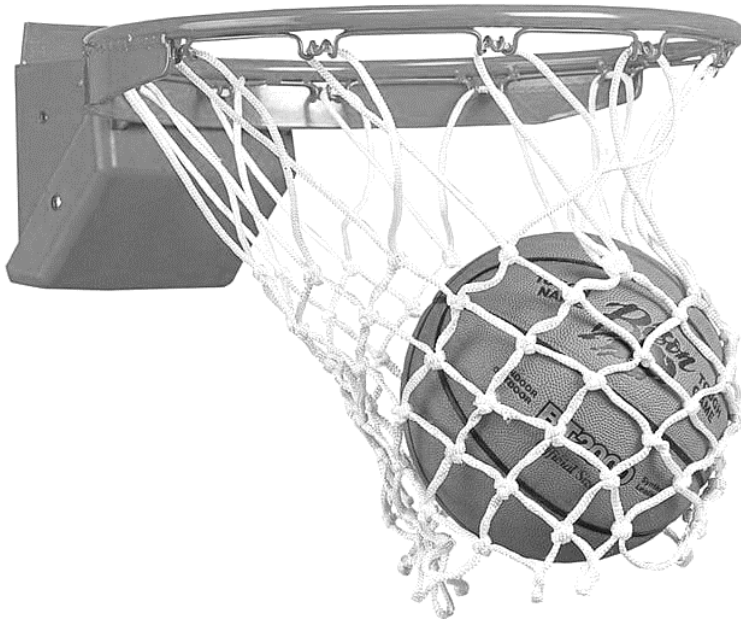
Still to come is the all-important match between *Cardinals* and *Killer Bees* which could decide how the championship goes. In fact, this match will be played tomorrow Saturday night.

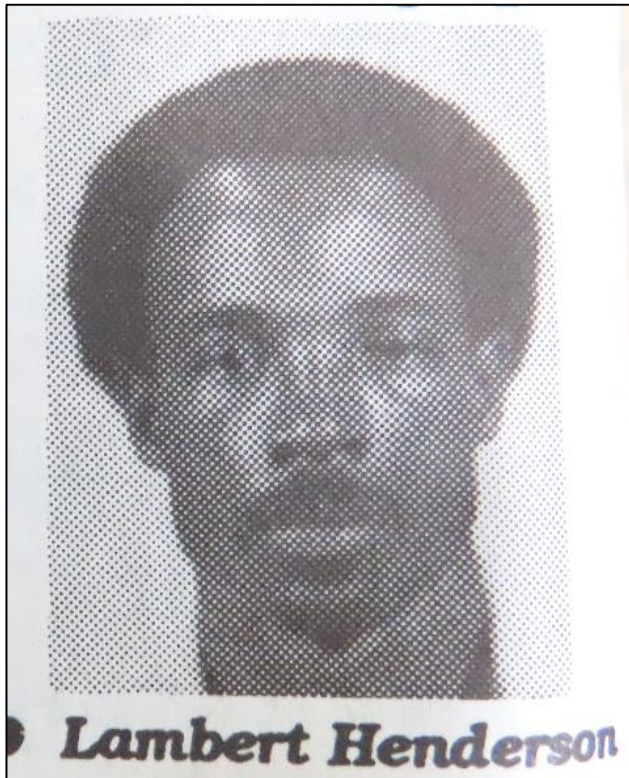

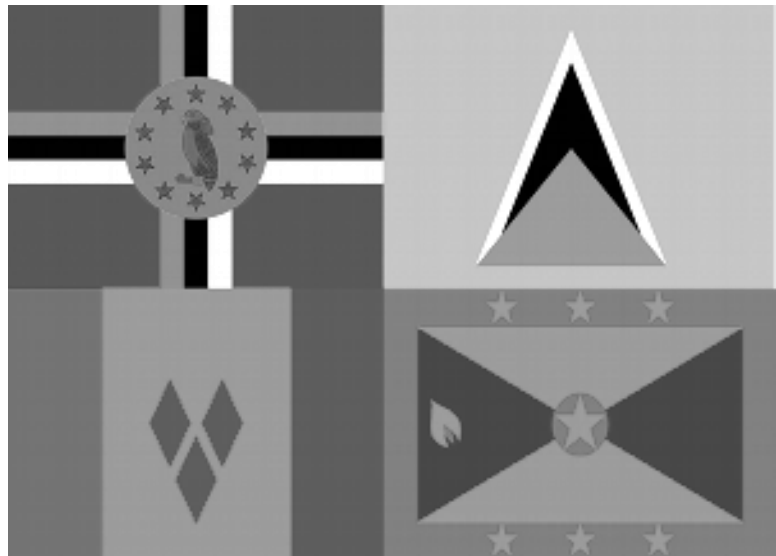

What may become a central dream in the lives of the boys and girls of Dominica is about to unfold starting on Sunday of this weekend the 24th July.

For some ten days the spotlight here will be taken up with the Windward Islands Secondary Schools Tournament which will see boys and girls from the secondary schools of Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia along with host territory Dominica competing for honours in six different sports disciplines: athletics, cricket, football, netball, basketball and table tennis.

The games used to take place annually at one time and then every two years at another time, and eventually were discontinued after 19xx.

With the decline of the tournament there seemed a general decline in manliness or at least the pursuit of manly sporting activities; and our secondary schools as institutions became relatively soft in their philosophies.

What it is hoped the revival of the tournament in 1987 will do for the Windwards is what was



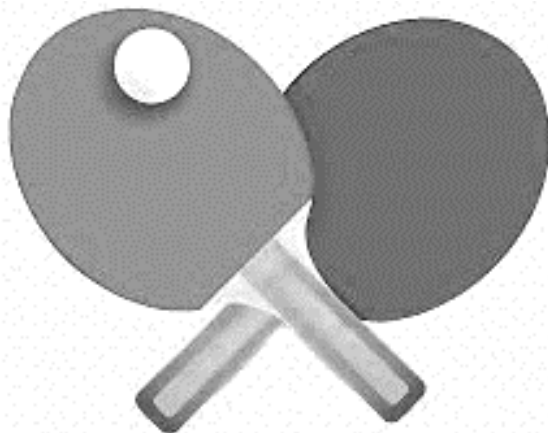
so often expressed by a former head of the Dominica Grammar School to his students: “I want you to develop a sense of honour.”

ARCHER

Those were the words of the late Victor Arthur Alleyne Archer – a St. Lucian by birth and who taught in Dominica in the fifties. Mr. Archer had himself taken part in the inter-schools tournaments long before they had enjoyed a previous revival at his instigation in the fifties.

What was evident to him, I am sure, was the fact that being a better academic went very well with being a very good sportsman or sportswoman.

When the 1988 Windward Islands Secondary Schools Tournament gets going at noon at Windsor Park on Sunday in two days’ time let us be thankful for the prospect of a return to sanity by our academic institutions and let us thank the many persons making it possible, including Cable and Wireless, Geest Industries etc. among the major sponsors.

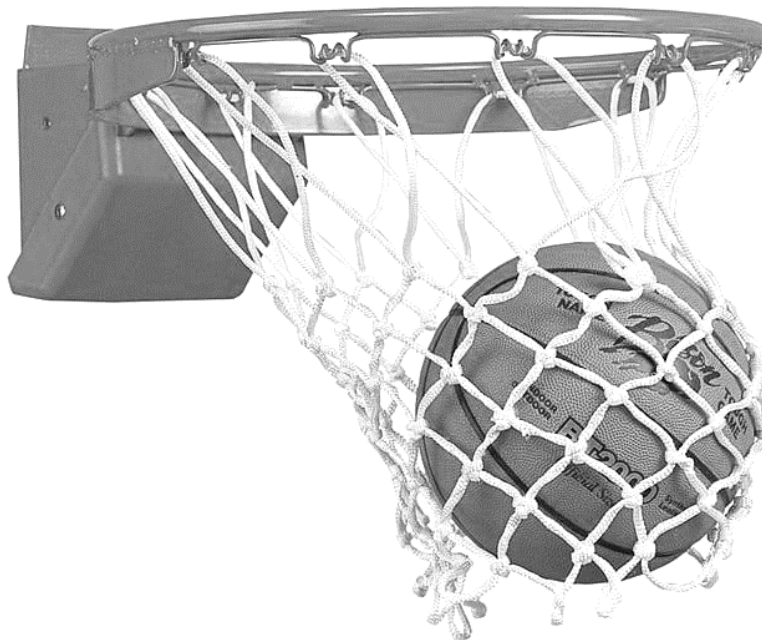
